


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### About the Author

Kathleen Stassen Berger completed her undergraduate education at Stanford University and Radcliffe College, earned her M.A.T. from Harvard University and an M.S. and Ph.D. from Yeshiva University. The author warns people to not trust theories, that correlation does not prove causation, then she states what I can only assume are her own opinions based on theories as fact. I will give evidence for my conclusions below. THIS BOOK SHOULD NOT BE USED TO TEACH A NEW GENERATION OF PROFESSIONALS, THEY WILL BE MISINFORMED.

During Chapter One, the section of this book that talks about always doing long-term studies to prove causation, and warns against the dangers of correlation being viewed as causation, the author gives the example of vaccines being blamed for autism. The author states that vaccines and autism was a dangerous mistake of correlation that wasn't truly causation.

Honestly, I am fine with this assertion, as the link has never been proven and there is a lot of evidence against the link.

However, the author goes on to state that autism might have been caused by damage to a fetus by the mother while the baby is in her uterus. Specifically, Berger states that "...now most experts believe something genetic or prenatal disrupted normal social connections in the brain. That implies either that the parents carry the genes for autism or that the mother harmed the fetal brain when she was pregnant, or both." (Berger, page 29. She states this as being evidenced by Persico & Merelli in 2014, I read this scholarly article and it did not say that, I will discuss this later).

As a mother of a child with autism spectrum disorder (ASD) who did everything my doctor told me while pregnant, this assertion obviously bothered me. It bothered me especially as I've done YEARS of research and have never even heard of this theory. I talked to a child and adolescent psychiatrist who treats autistic children, she also had not heard of this link.

So, I did a little research.

First, I will discuss the article Berger referenced to support her assertion that a mother damaging her fetus was likely the cause of autism. This article states that "Growing prenatal exposure to new environmental toxicants has been shown to potentially affect brain development, leading to altered cognitive, social, attentive, behavioral, and motor performance." (Persico & Merelli 2014. Here is the link to this article, if you want to read it fully: [...]

Excuse me Ms. Berger, how did you get the conclusion 'the mother damaged the fetus' from that? It sounds like this scholarly article is saying that an increase in environmental toxins are likely what's causing autism. You know, like pesticides, pollution or drugs administered to the pregnant women. But no, Berger doesn't

agree, she actually then goes and directly contradicts this obvious conclusion in the article she just referenced in the next sentence: "Understandably, some parents seek a cause a cause elsewhere. Among the possibilities are pollution, pesticides, or drugs administered during birth." (Berger, 29).

Let me state this loud and clear: NOTHING IN THE ARTICLE BLAMED THE MOTHER! It actually only states that toxins introduced to the fetus during pregnancy likely have some link to autism. Berger blatantly misuses this article to support a baseless and careless claim that autism has some link to mother's damaging their babies while in the uterus.

Ms. Berger should issue a public apology. This textbook is misinforming a new generation of professionals in the field that will work with families and children on the spectrum.

The only thing I could find to support her assertion (and it says nothing about mothers damaging the babies) was a THEORY in 2014 based on a nonmedical study of previously collected evidence by an associate professor at Princeton University named Dr. Wang. The article stated that he believed autism could be caused by damage to cerebellum during the second and third trimester. Again: this article also said nothing about mother's causing this.

Okay, so the author is telling people that you need to do long term research and medical studies to disprove a THEORY. That it is dangerous to tote theories as fact. And then in the same section, she says what I can only assume are her own ideas based on a scholarly article that states something completely different than what she's saying.

I dropped the class. I for one, do not want my head filled with someone's nonsense masquerading as fact.
